

Special situation report on Ramadi, Issue 2 April 21–24, 2015

Highlights

- The security situation in Al-Ramadi worsened on 18 April 2015. As a result thousands of internally displaced persons (IDPs) fled from Al-Ramadi (Al Boferage, Al Sofiya and Al Garma districts) to Al-Khaldia, Amriate Al-Fallujah, Al-Habanyia tourist city, Baghdad, Babil and Diwaniah. Following the displacement into various areas, the Government and UN partners stepped up efforts to support those displaced. Camps were erected in various placed while some displaced people moved in with relatives in host communities and others are being accommodated in mosques.
- An additional 149 displaced families from Ramadi arrived in Smawa, Muthana governorate, during this reporting period with more expected in the governorate.
- Ramadi General Hospital has re-opened its operations in Al Khalidiah to replace Al Rashid private hospital; rented by Anbar governorate.

• In Baghdad, mobile teams from health facilities nearest to areas where IDPs are currently sheltering are providing outreach health services to displaced people.

The table below shows areas where IDPs are currently seeking shelter in the above mentioned governorates, districts and towns and other proposed sites.

- Ramadi General Hospital, maternity and paediatric hospitals have remained closed for the past 5 days of the crisis due to insecurity.
- In Al-Anbar, the Directorate of Health continued renting a private hospital in Al Khaldiyah used to manage patients displaced from Ramadi. Health workers displaced from Ramadi have been asked to provide health care in the rented hospital.

Functional areas

Initial risk assessment

WHO and the Directorate of Health of Baghdad conducted an assessment to three IDP sites in Baghdad City, namely: Burhan Al Deen/Jamaa camp, Dahaaa Rawee and Jabar Mosque in the Khadraa quarter.

Findings

- Mobile teams from the nearest health facilities in the assessed areas are providing curative and preventive services for IDPs; these are spontaneous rather than structured.
- Primary health care centres are located within 1–2 km from camps.
- Sanitation is an issue in the sites visited with a lack of or a very limited number of latrines and showers available.

Urgent needs

One ambulance and one mobile team are needed to enhance health service delivery in the area. Essential medicines and human resources for health are urgently needed to support ongoing operations, among them; three medical doctors, six paramedical staff, two laboratory technicians, one pharmacist and two drivers.

Programmatic update

WHO has supported the Directorate of Health with one caravan to Al Khalidiah that will be used serve the health needs of displaced people.

Human resources

Currently, WHO has both international and national health professionals based in Baghdad and Sulyemaniah to support ongoing response activities. Two national staff are dedicated to visiting Al Fallujah to monitor events and work with departments of health and the Federal Ministry of Health in the area.

Planned activities

The situation of IDPs will be assessed in different locations to identify gaps and needs in terms of accessibility to basic preventive and curative health care services. The following areas will be assessed on the following dates and WHO will provide support to these needs based on the assessment.
