THE LEADERSHIP FOR HEALTH (LfH) PROGRAMME

(Second Round)

15 November 2015-30 January 2016

A joint collaboration between

The World Health Organization & The Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health

Background

The Leadership for Health (LfH) Programme, an initiative of the WHO Regional Office for the Eastern Mediterranean, aims at establishing a critical mass of public health leaders capable of addressing global, national and local health challenges. During the first round 25 upcoming leaders from Member State governments successfully completed the Programme. Building on this success, the second round of the Programme (2015-16) is being launched on 15 November 2015 in collaboration with the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health.

Duration

The Programme comprises two phases. The first phase will be held in Muscat, Oman, from 15 to 27 November 2015 followed by a second phase in Geneva, Switzerland, from 20 to 30 January 2016. In-between, participants will return to their home countries and prepare a paper addressing a specific health sector challenge within their context.

Methods and approach

The Programme is modular, utilizes non-traditional teaching methods and focuses on building key competencies in public health and leadership including understanding of health systems; politics of well-being and political analysis; organizational dynamics; change management; team building; and effective communication and advocacy.

During the second phase to be held in Geneva, Switzerland, participants will be provided with the opportunity to actively observe the proceedings of the WHO Executive Board Meeting (138th Session) and attend seminars on selected topics from its agenda.

Participants

The number of participants during the current round has been increased to 35. Participants include candidates from Member State governments, academia & research professionals, civil society and the private sector. Selection is based on:

- · prior training and qualifications in public health
- · experience in responsible management and/or leadership positions, and
- · demonstrated capacity of high performance in respective area of work

Outcomes

The LfH Programme will establish leaders who can:

- · proactively tackle national and local health problems that directly impact on the health of populations;
- · effectively pursue the five regional health priorities endorsed by Member States of the Region and;
- · play pro-active roles in the regional and global public health spheres
