



Referral of Patients from the Gaza Strip

Ref: RAD 11 (Dec. 18, 2012)

Summary

Palestinian causalities in the Gaza Strip as a result of the eight days of hostilities, November 14-21, 2012:

- 182 persons killed in Gaza; 24 (13%) females and 158 (87%) males; 47 (26%) were children. More than 88% of the fatalities had sustained multiple injuries.
- 1,399 persons injured in Gaza; 392 (28%) females and 1,007 (72%) males; 516 (37%) were children. Type of injuries: one third of all causalities suffered moderate to severe injuries; 483 required urgent surgery; 65 were admitted to intensive care units.
- Interrogated: 13 Gaza patients (2 F; 11 M) who had applied for permits in November to cross Erez checkpoint were requested to appear for Israeli security interviews.
- **Delayed**: 91 (29 F; 62 M) patients did not receive a response to their permit application and missed their hospital appointments.
- **Referrals to Egypt**: The number of regular referrals to Egypt increased during November despite the on-going physicians strike. 42 persons with war-related causalities crossed Rafah for treatment in Egypt, and several patients were transferred through Egypt to hospitals elsewhere in the region.
- **Referrals to Jordan**: Only two patients received financial coverage from the Ministry of Health for treatment in Jordanian hospitals.
- Medical reasons: Most November 2012 referrals were for: oncology (16%), nuclear medicine (10%), ophthalmology (8%) and urology (8%), paediatrics (7%), haematology (6%), neurosurgery (6%), orthopaedics (5%) and heart surgery (5%), and heart catheterization (4%). The estimated cost was NIS 9.6 million.
- Humanitarian access during hostilities: 45 out of 62 patients with approved permits crossed through Erez terminal during the 8 days of escalation, only one of which, a young girl, was a casualty. All other patients needed treatment abroad for other issues. 24 went to hospitals in the West Bank including East Jerusalem, and 21 were referrals to Israeli hospitals.

MONTHLY REPORT

Improved number of referrals

The total number of Gaza patients referred by the Ministry of Health (MoH) in November was 913, an increase over the number referred in October of 798, but still below the monthly average for 2012 of 1,157. According to Gaza Referral Abroad Department data, of the 913 MoH referrals, 337 (37%) were referred to hospitals in East Jerusalem, 224 (25%) to Egypt, 150 (16%) to Israel, 106 (12%) to West Bank hospitals, and only 2 (0.2%) to Jordan (**Table 1**).

The number of referrals inside Gaza to non-MoH facilities increased significantly in November compared with the previous 4 months. The need for Gaza referrals to private facilities inside Gaza increased because the lithotripsy machine in the European Gaza Hospital (MoH) for treating kidney and gall stones was out of order. Gaza referral data for November show a significant gender gap: 59% of referrals were males and 41% were females. 30% of all the referrals were children aged 0-17 years.

Patient applications for Israeli-issued permits to cross Erez

In November 2012, 725 patients' applications were submitted to the Israeli District Liaison Office (DCL) for permits to cross Erez and access hospitals in the West Bank including East Jerusalem, in Israel or Jordan, 8% fewer than applied in October (789), probably owing to the period of hostilities (November 14-21, 2012), when the number of patients applying for permits to cross Erez and the number of patients accessing Erez dropped significantly.

In November, 88% of Israeli permit applicants were referrals financially covered by MoH. The rest were covered by different sources (**Table 3**). Out of the 725 patient applications, 87% (629 patients) were approved permits. 5 male patients were denied permits to cross Erez. Four of these patients had appointments in East Jerusalem hospitals and one in a West Bank hospital. Thirteen patients (2 females and 11 males) (1.8%) were requested to appear for security interviews with the Israeli GSS as a precondition to process their application; 2 of those requested were over 60 years of age). Of the 13, only 2 patients were issued a permit following interrogation (**Table 4**).

12.55% (91 patients) received no answer to their applications and missed their hospital appointment date; of these 60 had appointments in West Bank hospitals including East Jerusalem, and 31 in Israeli hospitals. Of the 91 delayed patients, 24 (26.4%) had applied more than 2 weeks before their hospital date, and 8 (8.8%) had applied more than one month before their appointment. 26 of the delayed patients were children and 29 were females.

The Palestinian General Authority for Civil Affairs registered 571 patients and 572 companions travelling through Erez checkpoint towards Israel during November. 36 patients were transferred by ambulance through Erez. Since

Palestinian ambulances are not permitted to leave Gaza, patients must be transferred from a Palestinian ambulance, and carried on a gurney to an Israeli-plated ambulance at Erez crossing 200 meters away (**Table 5**).

According to the Emergency Medical Services of MoH in Gaza, their office coordinated the travel of 637 people to Egypt. 43 patients were transferred by ambulance with 46 companions. The remaining 548 were patients and their companions who travelled through Rafah terminal as regular passengers.
