

Highlights:

- ❖ 4 AFP cases were detected in Damascus, Hamah, Sweida, and Lattakia.
- ❖ There is a slight decrease in number of AJS in this week
- ❖ A notable decrease in number of SARI cases was noticed this week.

Completeness& Timeliness of Reporting


❖ The overall completeness of reporting was 70%; (454 out of total 650 EWARS sentinel sites). (See Graph 1). 14 governorates have reported this week.



❖ Timeliness of reporting is 73%.


The Morbidity Cases

- ❖ Out of the 146,108 total consultations, a total of 16,495 cases were reported; of which 8,274 cases were Influenza like Illness (50%), 3,777 cases were Acute Diarrhoea (23%), 960 cases of AJS, 191 cases of Sever Acute Respiratory Infection, 66 cases of Bloody Diarrhoea, 32 cases of Suspected Measles, 14 cases of Meningitis, and 4 AFP cases.
- ❖ Below chart reflects the trend in the number of SARI cases in 2014 and 2015 in the period between week 38 2014 and week 6-2015.




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❖ Graph 3displays the trend of the (27,179) AJS cases between wk23/2014-wk6/2015. The distribution of the cases per governorates shows that Idleb, DierEzor, and Damascus have the highest number of cases for this week. A decrease in the number of cases was noticed for this week.



- ❖ In total, 3,177 cases were reported as "other diseases". The most important diseases reported within this group were: 513 cases of Leishmaniasis (most of which were reported from Hamah 33%, Idleb15% Rural Damascus 15%, and), 159 cases of Typhoid (most of which were reported from Rural Damascus 38% and DierEzor 25%), 68 cases of Brucellosis (most of which were reported from DierEzor 38%), 11 cases of Pertussis, and11 cases of TB.
- ❖ 54% of the cases were distributed among≥ 5 age group.
- ❖ ILI consists (54%) of the cases among <5 and (47%) among ≥ 5, while AD cases consists (26%) among <5 and (20%) among ≥ 5.
- ❖ Graphs 4 and 5 below show the proportional morbidity among < 5 and ≥ 5 year age groups respectively.

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❖ 51% of cases were distributed among males.

The Response

AFP: Stool samples were collected from the AFP cases and sent to the reference lab in Damascus. A national vaccination campaign will be implemented between 15th and19th February.

AJS and water and food borne diseases: a preparation for a huge health promotion campaign regarding food & water –borne diseases is taking place and should be carried out in all governorates throughout the country, including a daily educational sessions in all primary health centres, PHC, schools, and IDPs shelters concerning these diseases, focusing on the importance of both personal and hand hygiene. Moreover, educational posters and brochures will be distributed among the audience. While awareness campaign about food and water borne diseases continues through media (TV programmes, radio programmes, newspapers ...). The RRTs in all governorates continue conducting field visits to the IDPs shelters and schools to evaluate the health and environmental situation, and raise the awareness about food and water borne diseases.

SARI: Awareness bulletin has been prepared and sent to the media office in MOH to be disseminated via media channels. Also participations in TV and radio programs continue to raise awareness about the disease and preventive measures.
