The World Health Organization (WHO) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Atlanta, developed the Global Health Professions Student Survey to track tobacco use among health professions students across countries using a common methodology and core questionnaire. Information from the Survey is compiled within the participating country by a Research Coordinator nominated by the Ministry of Health, and technically reviewed by WHO and CDC. The content has not otherwise been edited by WHO or CDC.

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Sudan - Dental Students (3rd Year Students Only) Global Health Professions Student Survey (GHPSS)

FACT SHEET

The Sudan dental students GHPSS includes data on prevalence of cigarette smoking and use of other tobacco products, knowledge and attitudes about tobacco use, exposure to secondhand smoke, desire for smoking cessation, and training received during dental school regarding patient counseling on smoking cessation techniques. This information could be very useful in monitoring and developing Sudan's comprehensive tobacco control program. The Sudan dental students GHPSS was a school-based survey of 3^{rd} year dental students attending the 6 dental schools in Sudan conducted in 2007. The school response rate was 100% and the student response rate was 56.2%. A total of 135 students participated in the Sudan dental students GHPSS.
