

Country fact sheets

The World Health Organization (WHO) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Atlanta, developed the Global Youth Tobacco Survey to track tobacco use among youth across countries using a common methodology and core questionnaire. Information from the Survey is compiled within the participating country by a Research Coordinator nominated by the Ministry of Health, and technically reviewed by WHO and CDC. The content has not otherwise been edited by WHO or CDC.

Environmental Tobacco Smoke

- 29.1% live in homes where others smoke in their presence
- 48.7% are around others who smoke in places outside their home
- 75.4% think smoking should be banned from public places
- 36.7% think smoke from others is harmful to them
- 29.3% have one or more parents who smoke 9.1% have most or all friends who smoke

Media and Advertising

- 80.1% saw anti-smoking media messages, in the past 30 days
- 76.0% saw pro-cigarette ads on billboards, in the past 30 days
- 65.1% saw pro-cigarette ads in newspapers or magazines, in the past 30 days

were selected with probability proportional to enrollment size.

- More than 1 in 10 students currently use any form of tobacco; 5.8% of the students currently smoke cigarettes; 12.5% currently use some other form of tobacco.
- ETS exposure is high over onequarter of the students live in homes where others smoke, and almost half of the students are exposed to smoke around others outside of the home; Nearly onethird of the students have a parent who smokes and almost 1 in 10 students have friends who smoke.
- More than one-third of the students think smoke from others is harmful to them.
- Over 1 in 10 students was offered a free cigarette by a tobacco company representative.
- Over 8 in 10 students saw antismoking media messages in the past 30 days; More than twothirds of students saw procigarette ads in the past 30 days.
