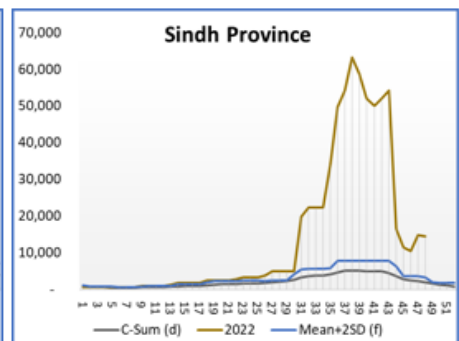
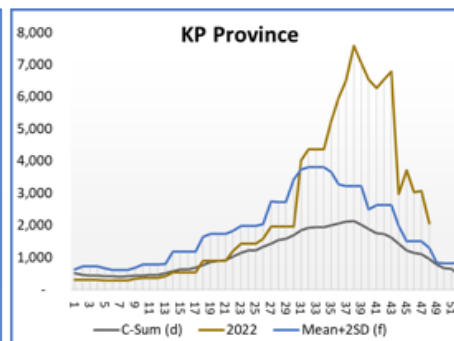
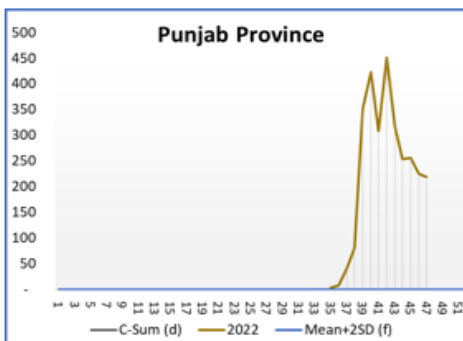
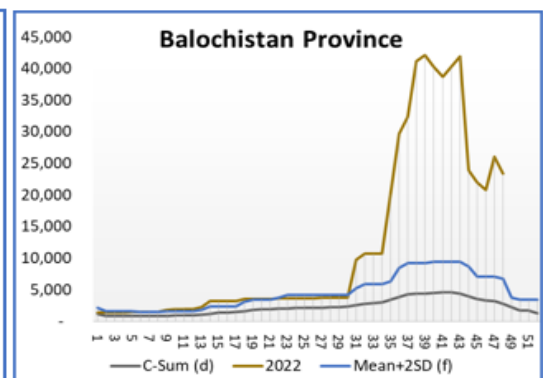
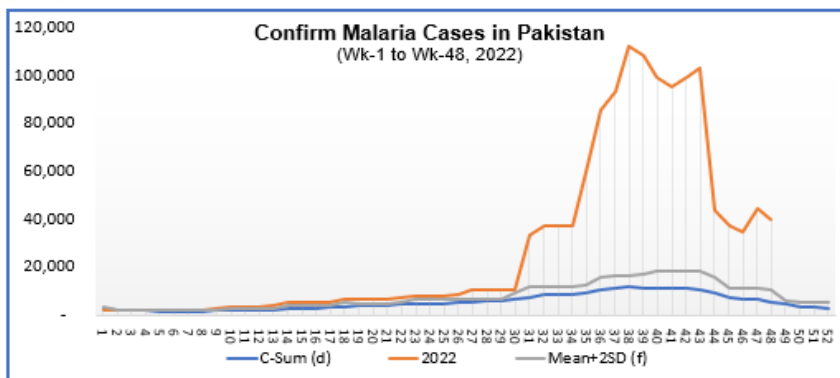


SITUATION OVERVIEW

- Flood Water receded in Sindh province up to **85%** and still remaining (around 0.5 – 2 ft) mainly in Dadu, Jamshoro, Mitiari, Tando Allah yar and Naushahro Feroz. In Balochistan province around **95%** flood water receded and remaining (0.5-1 ft) in Sohbatpur and Jafarabad). It is also observed that flood water completely receded in Punjab and KP provinces.
- According to PDMA, less than 200,000 displaced populations in Sindh province as most have returned to their original places.
- In flood-affected areas, waterborne and vector-borne diseases, and acute respiratory illnesses remains a major public health concern in some areas although overall reduction is observed. According to PDMA Sindh 3,730,560 mosquito nets have been distributed to the flood affected districts of Sindh and other specific interventions to control malaria also initiated in high burden areas.
- Total 3,614 affected population are still living in relief camps while 23,097 are living in Tents Cities/Villages (PDMA Sindh).

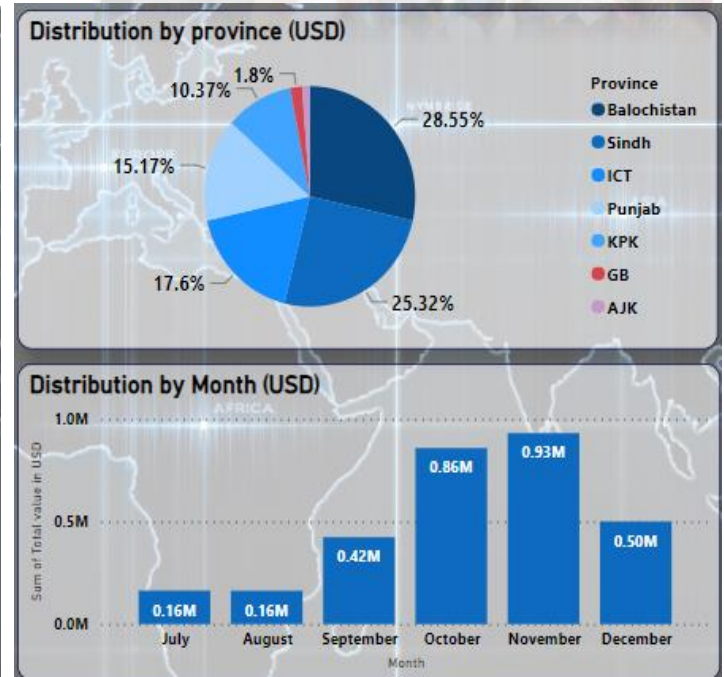
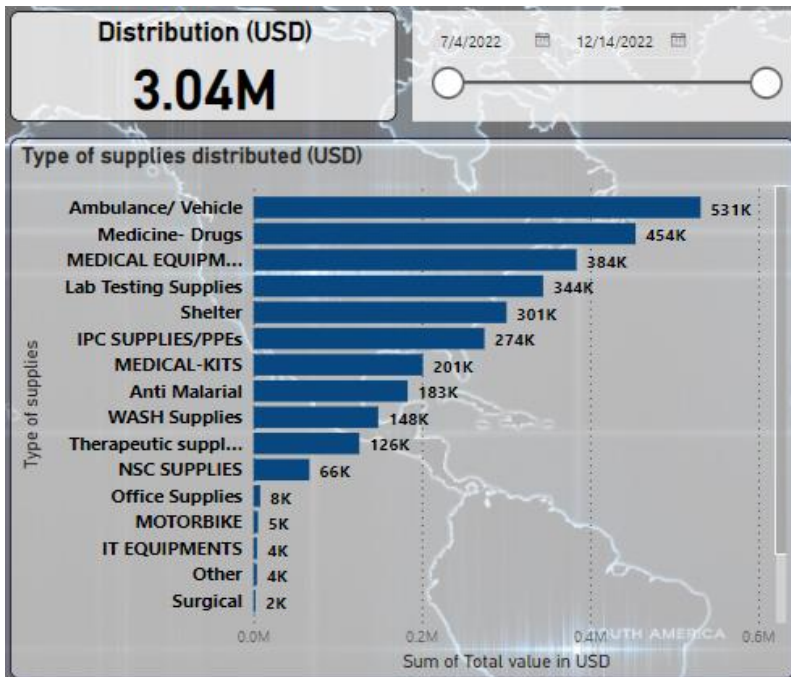


WHO RESPONSE

- WHO and the EPI programme in Punjab have jointly started enhanced outreach activities focusing on the two flood-affected districts, Rajanpur & Dera Ghazi Khan covering all union councils and eight other districts reporting low routine Immunization coverage.
- A significantly high number of children were vaccinated during the first week of vaccination campaign. More than 13,059 zero-dose children were vaccinated during this enhanced outreach activities.
- WHO organized community orientation sessions on preventive measures of AWD and cholera at Jamal Khan Bugti village, Balochistan. WHO team conducted health education sessions in the affected communities and distributed Hygiene kits, and dignity kits.
- WR Pakistan handed over essential medicines, equipment, and supplies to the Health Department, Balochistan. This included antimalarial medicines, laboratory supplies and equipment, nutrition supplies and equipment for RMNCH services in flood affected districts.
- Four WHO's supported Nutrition Stabilization Centers (NSCs) in Punjab (Rajanpur and DG Khan) have been established. Training of the staff & health care providers in NSCs in Punjab, Sindh and Balochistan has been completed .
- WHO dispatched required (F75 and F100) Therapeutic milk to affected districts in all provinces (4 NSCs Punjab, 45 NSC Sindh, KPK 14 NSCs, Balochistan 19, GB 2, AJK 2 @ ICT 2 NSCs).
