


SITUATION OVERVIEW

- In many flood-affected areas across Pakistan, floodwaters are receding. However, flood waters still stand in different districts of Sindh and Balochistan.
- Total 7,180,396 displaced peoples have been returned to their homes. 3,614 still living in relief camps while 214,240 are living by their own (PDMA Sindh).
- In 2022 till the end of epi week 47, a total of 396 cases of diphtheria, 142 Pertussis, and 408 cases of neonatal tetanus have been reported.
- United Nations Satellite Centre (UNOSAT) imagery indicates an estimated 8 million people are still potentially exposed to floodwaters or living close to flooded areas
- National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) holds first winter contingency and preparedness planning conference emphasizing on adopting the advanced and technology-driven disaster management and public awareness campaigns to stave off intersecting challenges of climate change.


Health Sector Response:

- A total of 1,286,384 people has benefitted from the services of the outreach camps by 114 functional mobile health teams. A total of 1,015,907children including 530,280 girls received immunization against measles.
- International Medical Corps (IMC) have provided 23,050 consultations from 6th Sept onwards in different districts of Sindh and KP.
- Sexual & reproductive health (SRH) response to 280,000 individuals including 88,500 RH services. More than 450 healthcare providers including LHVs, WMOs, CMWs and medical technicians are engaged to provide BEmONC services in 35 static health facilities, visiting communities through 65 Mobile Outreach Teams and strengthening Comprehensive EmONC in 9 health facilities.
- More than 11,072 patients reached with PHC mobile health services, 173 beneficiaries reached with MHPSS Services, 41 beneficiaries received health promotion and awareness session, 85 health workers trained on PFA and 17 health facilities are supported for rehabilitation and repair.

Health Sector Priorities over the coming weeks:

- Maintained Health Sector coordination through, established Committees, to continue regular field coordination and assessments of the magnitude of the damage to inform planning and informed decision on priority health needs.
- Maintenance of heightened communicable diseases surveillance and insurance of robust investigation and monitoring of upsurge diseases trends in some scattered pockets.
- Strengthen growth monitoring and nutrition stabilization centers (NSCs) in the flood affected districts to continue treatment of children with Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) accompanied with complications.
- Continue providing access to health care for displaced and returned population in the flood affected areas through the 5,000 mobile health camps which have been established to respond to primary health care needs of the affected communities.
